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Founder Foreword



A ugust 2021 - July 2022 was Street Storage's third year of operation. On the one hand I find that impossible to believe - it feels like only yesterday I was on Hornsey Road in Islington in a 20 person makeshift storage unit wondering if the service would even be used or needed. On the other hand we have grown so quickly in these past three years that it seems incomprehensible that it's only been three years....

This period saw another huge jump in demand for our service - as you can see from the infographics detailed later in this report. We continued to grow to respond to this demand, although this has not been without its challenges. Staff worked tirelessly to keep up and people are coming to us in far greater need than ever before. We continued to offer a transport service and an advocacy and signposting service to hundreds of people

annually but it has been a difficult time for both fundraising and staff wellbeing as the sector reels from the pandemic. We remain active in national and local campaigning, forums and coalitions and are finding our voice more as an organisation as we collaborate with our partner organisations and other charities struggling with changes with staffing, funding and sector demand.

The latter half of 2021 saw Street Storage continue to respond to the COVID19 pandemic. We had to push through multiple outbreaks amongst our small staff team and manage additional (longer term) sicknesses, as well as keep the storage units open amid closures of neighbouring charities who didn't survive the pandemic.

In addition, we continued to vaccinate the homeless community weekly, supporting people into accommodation to sleep off the side effects and managing boosters and follow up third and fourth jabs long into 2022. Vaccinations (right) moved from The Francis Crick Institute to Bidborough House in December 2021 and we called it a day in July 2022 when demand dried up. I am extremely proud that Street Storage was able to take such a leading role in the emergency pandemic response from Day 1 - and continues to do so.





COVID aside, this financial year saw us continue to partner with the Cinnamon Network (left) on internal growth and development - building our support team and implementing better systems and back-end support for the service here in London. We started working in mid-2022 with HelpFilm on an animation that highlights what we do and why in order to raise our public profile and diversify our funding sources. Our Referral Manager and Outreach Worker, Caroline Allouf, hit the ground running at the start of the financial year and has transformed the service into one of empathy, community, support and passion. Bringing Caroline on has also had a huge impact on the demand for the service as our reputation grows and more and more people use the service each week.

In this period we said goodbye to Michal our Security Guard in November 2022 and to Ben Ferris our Marketing and Fundraising Manager in January 2022. Thank you both for your commitment to our organisation during your time here. We said hello to our Bookkeeper Lisa Mulholland in September 2022, who has become invaluable to work alongside, to Simon Webb our Fundraising Manager in April 2022, who is extremely good at what he does and to Laura Balerdi in May 2022 - who comes with creativity and an energy to manage our Marketing and Comms. I want to thank you all - again - for your continued support over the past 12 months - whether that be financial, voluntary, through goods and services or emotional encouragement. Particular thanks must go to our funders and financial supporters, many of whom were flexible enough to repurpose our grants as staff responded to (and recovered from) the pandemic, and to our wonderful Trustees, team members and volunteers. I am immensely proud of what Street Storage continues to become and the tenacity we all show day in day out to stand alongside a community in crisis.

We hope you continue to support and follow us on our journey to provide free, safe and accessible storage to people experiencing homelessness across the country.






Our Service

We received 276 referrals during this period.

Our current data shows that of these referrals...

184 (66.7%) referrals followed up and stored with us.



94 people's belongings were all released, making up 52% of those who followed up.

Of those whose items were released, 81 (84%) found suitable accommodation, whether permanent or temporary

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140 referrals identify as male, **85** as female, **1** as non-binary.


50 preferred not to say.

46.9% of referrals were Non-British. This number is made up of at least 14 other named nationalities.


Self Referrals

A word from Referral Manager and Outreach Worker Caroline Allouf about her first year with us...

Well what a year it's been! It actually feels as though I've been at Street Storage all of my life - in a good way! The year started with a focus upon really getting out there into the community, increasing the profile of Street Storage amongst those who may need to use us as well as workers, volunteers and people in general who all play such an important part in directing others to us. I ran interactive sessions with local authority homelessness and housing services, mental health teams, and probation services, amongst others. As the year progressed, so did the numbers of people using our service and the reasons for them experiencing homelessness.

The significant shift over the year is from solely being a service keeping people's belongings safe, to one which builds meaningful relationships with individuals, offering a safe, warm, non judgemental and non hierarchical space for people to be, offering advice, advocating for people and helping them to grow and flourish.

Future Growth

"What next?", you might ask.

The theme of this report has clearly been 'we have seen unprecedented demand and therefore thank you to everyone who supported us to continue to meet that demand'.

Unfortunately, we don't see this situation changing anytime soon. The aftermath of the pandemic and the approaching Cost of Living crisis will mean more and more people forced into working poverty and many more will face the horrific reality of losing their home.



We aim to respond to this by:

Premises Growth. We are looking at securing a much larger, consolidated London HQ from which to store 400+ people's belongings and to give our growing staff team space to work effectively, with longer opening hours and more flexible access to storage.

Advocacy. We plan to support more people on a one-to-one basis around housing, employment, access to services and wellbeing.





Transport Programme. We plan to expand our fleet of volunteer drivers to improve our street-to-storage offering.

UK Replication. We are in conversations with three or four UK cities around the viability of Street Storage in these areas and are developing a blueprint model for replication across the country.





Support Hires. We will look to hire both front line and administrative support staff to bolster this response.

Building Community. We will continue to use our Hackney and Camden offices and units as a place of sanctuary and community for everyone we see, whether through art or a cuppa or the chance to charge a phone and have a rest.





Campaigns. We will always raise our voices around housing rights, homelessness legislation and systems change.
